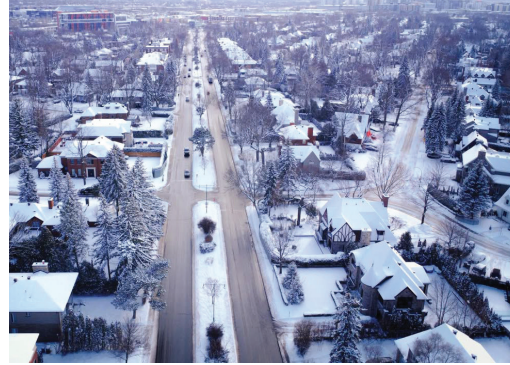

## LOOKING AHEAD TO A YEAR OF PROGRESS

For the second consecutive year, Mount Royal has been recognized as the most livable town in Quebec by *The Globe & Mail*. This honor is a testament to our community's vitality and resilience. As we look ahead, I am excited to announce that 2025 will be a landmark year for Mount Royal, marked by transformative projects that will enhance our Town, invigorate its spirit, and meet the evolving needs of our residents.

### Modern Spaces for Essential Services

The long-awaited Community and Sports Centre (CSC) is set to take a significant step forward in 2025, with groundbreaking anticipated this summer. Designed in a forward-thinking design-build approach, the CSC will provide an inclusive, modern space tailored to the sporting, cultural, and social needs of our community. This new Centre will serve as a vital gathering place for residents of all ages, fostering connection and belonging.

The CSC will be located on the lot adjacent to the current Recreation Centre (REC) and the Town Hall parking lot, offering convenient underground parking access. Highlights of the facility include an indoor swimming pool, a double gymnasium, multi-purpose community and training rooms, and spaces dedicated to the arts.

Simultaneously, the 30-40 Roosevelt project is progressing rapidly. Now in the plans and specifications phase, this new building will replace the outdated 10-20 Roosevelt structure and include a state-of-the-art fire station (#74). It will also house modernized administrative offices for Public Security, Urban Planning, and Engineering teams.

The project, a joint effort between the City of Montreal and Mount Royal, has been designed with sustainability in mind. Its hybrid concrete and wood structure and optimized layout reflect our commitment to meeting both current and future needs. 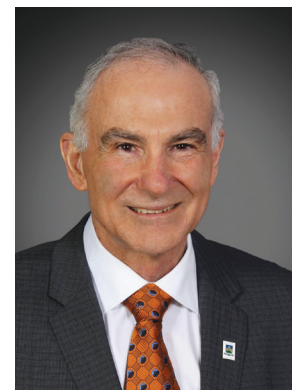

## CELEBRATING ART AND CULTURE IN MOUNT ROYAL!

I'm pleased to share with you the Town's efforts to highlight our rich cultural heritage. Over the years, we have acquired an impressive collection of works of art, which you can admire at Town Hall, in the library and in our parks in the form of sculptures, murals and other public art installations.

The year 2025 will mark a very special event for our Town. *The Table ronde sur l'art de Mont-Royal* (ARTTRAM) will be celebrating its 25th anniversary. I'd like to extend my warmest congratulations to the many artists and other friends of the visual arts who have made this grouping of mostly local creators a flamboyant and essential showcase for art and culture in our community. The Town is proud to support ArtTram's initiatives, and in particular the Salon d'Art, held annually at the Town Hall. This year, the fair will take place on May 23, 24 and 25, 2025. Long live the arts, artists and 25 years of passion!

In addition, the agreement between the Town and the University of Montreal will finally allow the installation of the piece **Écllosion** by the talented sculptor Claude Millette. This large-format, mechanically-welded assemblage of stainless steel will soon find its place on avenue Beaumont, just a few steps from the MIL complex footbridge, where it will further enrich the Town's artistic landscape.

You may also have noticed that the sculpture **La Mère et l'Enfant** (Mother and Child), created in 1959 by artist Anne Kahane, has been removed from its position near the library for complete restoration. This initiative is designed to restore the sculpture to its original brass patina, and we look forward to reinstalling it where it will once again shine in all its splendor.

Finally, the Town has also invested in the restoration of the emblematic red telephone booth, a true urban heritage of Mount Royal. This **K6 model**, designed by Sir Giles Gilbert Scott in 1935, was donated to the Town after Expo 67 and embodies a piece of our collective history. Now brighter than ever, the booth has been refurbished to its former glory. Come and rediscover it in Desjardins Park, where it continues to attract the attention of residents and visitors alike, and take the opportunity to consult the information panel that tells its unique story.

Thank you for sharing our pride and celebrating our artistic, cultural and heritage achievements together.

## SEPTEMBER 30, 2025: DEADLINE FOR SECURING YOUR POOL

Residential pools represent a significant risk of drowning for young children, especially when they are not properly supervised or secured.

As of July 1, 2021, the provincial regulation on residential pool safety applies retroactively to all pools and spas in Quebec, without exception. All pool and spa owners in Mount Royal must ensure that their installations meet the latest standards before the **September 30, 2025** deadline.

CodeRED is a high-speed telecommunication system that allows us to reach you quickly by phone, email, and text messaging in the event of a major disaster. Its use is reserved for critical situations. The number that will appear on your caller ID is **1-866-419-5000**.

Then, fill out the registration form found on the page. If you're not sure whether you're registered, don't hesitate to register as a precaution. The system automatically deletes duplicates.

## 72-HOUR KIT: BE READY IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY!

In a serious emergency situation, you'll need some basic supplies so you can be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours. You may have to get by without electricity or running water. In fact, the ice storm of April 5, 2023 proved that a situation of this magnitude can happen at any time. It is very important to be aware of the risks we may face.

A basic emergency kit includes the following items:

- Water – Two liters of water per person per day
- Food – Non-perishable foods such as canned goods, energy bars and dehydrated foods
- Hand-held can opener – Hand-cranked or battery-powered flashlight and radio – Spare batteries
- First – aid kit and special-needs items – Extra keys for car and home
- Cash – Emergency plan

## CREATION OF A SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE



The Town of Mount Royal is pursuing its commitment to the environment by creating a Sustainable Development and Climate Change Committee. This committee, made up of four elected officials, eight “citizen” members (one representative per district), as well as members of the municipal administration, depending on the topics addressed, will be mandated to propose measures that will help the Town meet the challenges of the environment and climate change.

The Committee’s main responsibilities also include reviewing the 2021-2025 Sustainable Development Plan, proposing orientations on issues such as waste management, tree protection, greenhouse gas reduction, and other subjects submitted by Council. The committee will then submit its recommendations and reports to the Town. Following the call for applications, the appointment of the eight citizen members is scheduled for the February 2025 regular council meeting.

The council’s committee on sustainable development and climate change proposes an active engagement of Townies in reflection and action to preserve our environment.

## PROTECT YOUR HOME DURING HEAVY RAINFALL

The exceptional downpours that have struck the Greater Montreal area in recent years have led to the influx of massive amounts of water into the sewer systems in record time. This overload can result in backflows, a situation that affects not only residences in Mount Royal, but also several neighbourhoods in Montreal and other surrounding communities.

No one can predict whether these extreme precipitation events will occur again this summer, but the Town is taking short-, medium-, and long-term measures to strengthen the resilience of our community against such events. In addition to regular maintenance of the sewer lines, the Town is continuing the calibration of the hydraulic model to better understand the current capacity of the network. A Master Plan for stormwater management, which will include an analysis of innovative solutions and pilot projects, is currently under way. This plan is scheduled to be submitted in June and will serve as the basis for upcoming infrastructure work. The Town is also continuing its discussions with Montreal regarding the agglomeration network into which Mount Royal’s water is discharged. Finally, new urban planning regulations are planned to improve water management on private properties.

That said, despite all the measures the Town is taking to adapt infrastructure to new climate realities, you must also leave nothing to chance to effectively protect your residence before the rainy season begins.

First, it is essential to consult an experienced plumber who is a member of the Corporation of Master Pipe-Mechanics of Quebec (CMMTQ) to guide you through appropriate procedures and best practices.

In addition to regularly inspecting your foundations for cracks, here are some preventive measures homeowners should take to avoid water damage in the basement:



- Install and maintain a backflow valve on all secondary connections;
- Ensure that gutters are not connected to the foundation drain (French drain);
- Ensure adequate drainage that directs surface water away from your property;
- Limit impermeable ground surfaces on your land;
- Regularly clean and inspect the sump pump.

In addition, if you have a downhill driveway, you may want to consider redesigning it and, if necessary, adding a rise at the top of the driveway. This will help and act as a barrier against run-off water.

## SNOW REMOVAL

After heavy snowfalls, snow removal operations along the Town's 97 km of streets and 179 km of sidewalks are usually completed within 72 to 96 hours in accordance with the Snow Removal Policy

As a resident, regardless of whether you remove the snow yourself from the entrance to your home or garage, or you hire a snow clearing contractor to do the work, you have the responsibility of respecting By-law No. 1432 on Snow Removal. Among other things, it stipulates that dumping snow on streets and sidewalks is illegal. Dumping snow on fire hydrants is also prohibited. Snow removal contractors must obtain a permit and install a visible identification post next to any location where they carry out their operations.

**IMPORTANT:** During snow removal operations carried out by the Town, it is important to respect the temporary signage in place to facilitate operations and avoid being towed. Please note that temporary parking permits are not valid during snow removal operations.

## BLUE BIN COLLECTION: REMINDER OF GUIDELINES

Since June 5, 2024, Éco Entreprises Québec has managed recycling collection (blue bins) in TMR. The process is now mechanized on most residential streets, requiring adherence to specific guidelines to ensure your bin is picked up.

To ensure collection, please:

- Place your bin out between 19:00 the night before and 7:00 on collection day.
- Position the bin 15-30 cm from the curb, with the front facing the street and 30 cm of clearance around it.
- Keep the lid fully closed.
- Only include accepted materials (no black bags, wood, batteries, etc.).
- Avoid obstructing or improperly positioning the bin.

Damaged bins must be reported to the Town for repair or replacement. Note that only recyclables inside the bin will be collected.

**If your bin is non-compliant, an orange door hanger will explain the issue.** Thank you for following these guidelines to ensure efficient and sustainable recycling.

Additionally, The Town of Mount Royal makes it easy for you to repair, replace or request a new blue, green or brown wheeled bin.

Here's how:

- Fill out the appropriate form, available on the Residual materials collection for residents page of the Town's website.
- Once your request has been submitted, a city employee will contact you to provide instructions and set up an appointment.

This service is offered on a continuous basis, without a specific day. For blue bins, requests must be submitted before 11:30, the day before the collection day, by consulting the collection calendar. # REPORT ON THE 2025 OPERATING BUDGET

Dear Fellow Citizens,

In accordance with section 474 of the Cities and Towns Act and on behalf of Town Council, I am pleased to submit to you Town of Mount Royal’s Report on the 2025 Operating Budget.

This year, the municipal administration is announcing a property tax increase of 2.52% for all taxpayers. This considered decision reflects our desire to maintain quality services while also addressing the challenges of environmental imperatives and a difficult economy.

The 2025 operating budget totals \$136.1 million, a 4.61% increase from the preceding year. However, in view of the major projects currently underway, we focused our budgeting efforts mainly on day-to-day management of operations without introducing any new programs but keeping Townies at the centre of our priorities.

## Budget priorities

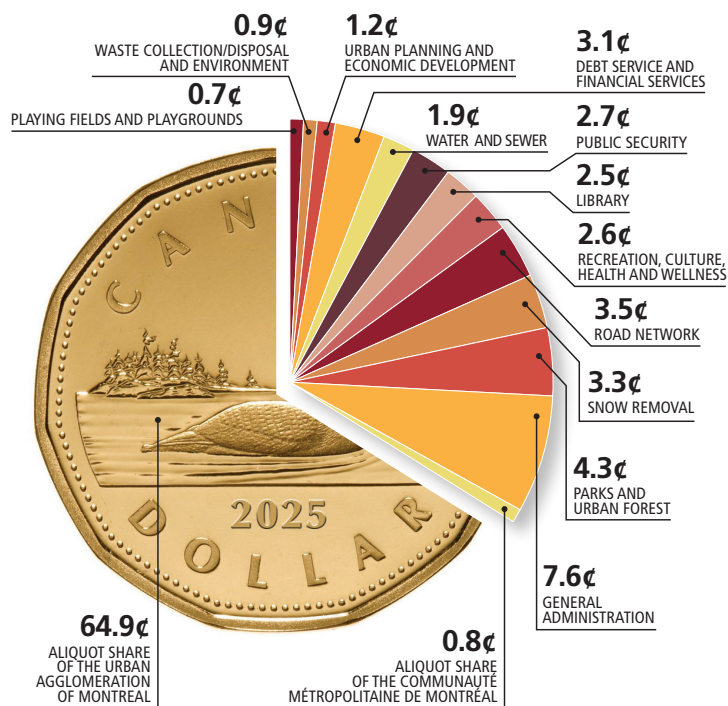
First, it should be noted that the administrative, management and financing expenses associated with major projects, such as the construction of the Sports and Community and Sports Centre and the new 30/40 Roosevelt building, are included in the operating budget. Though technically part of our triennial capital expenditures program, these major projects also have an impact on the operating budget.

## The priorities for the 2025 operating budget are to:

- Improve the Town’s drainage system by working on various alternatives available to the municipality and solutions for upgrading existing systems to counteract the problem of flooding during torrential rains.
- Continue and adopt the special planning program (PPU) for the Beaumont sector, one that will improve residents’ quality of life. The plan will define a strategic vision and clear objectives for the harmonious development of the sector.
- Create a bike path network covering the entire Town, with a focus on improved integration and the greening of the Bates and Plymouth sectors.
- Review and update the zoning by-law so it better reflects current urban issues, anticipates future needs and aligns with the best practices in urban planning and development.

## YOUR TAXES

Each dollar of your tax bill goes toward the following services:



- Continue the efforts to guarantee road safety, accessibility and traffic flow. Implement innovative solutions for reducing traffic speed and controlling transit journeys.
- Implement an asset management plan and a strategy to maintain infrastructures in good condition and deliver sustainable services to citizens.
- Study the possibility of introducing paid parking in Town centre to diversify the Town’s sources of income.

## Growth of the 2025 operating budget

The 2025 operating budget totals \$136.1 million, up 4.61% from the 2024 budget. The increase is primarily due to growth in the costs for existing commitments and operational priorities.

**Specifically, the following factors contributed to the increase:**

- Local expenditures rose \$3.7 million or 6.35%, a change mainly attributable to:
  - an increase in payroll, mandatory employer costs and employee benefits;
  - an inflation-driven increase in the costs for external contracts;
  - expenses related to the inspection and cleaning of Agglomération water and sewer lines. This expense is offset by an equivalent income from a third party.
- A total increase of \$2.3 million (3.24%) in the aliquot share paid to the Agglomération de Montréal for general expenditures, water purchases, water service, first responder services, the arterial road system debt, funding investments eligible for grants, financing the deficits from previous fiscal years and the contribution for expenditures related to downtown Montreal.

Property taxes, compensation in lieu of taxes and water billing, which remain our main sources of revenue, for a total of \$114.9 million or 87% of overall revenue.

Additional revenue of \$0.5 million is budgeted due to the special contribution to the Royalmount Pedestrian Walkway reserve fund. This contribution is applicable to all taxable buildings located in a sector determined by the Town, namely the Royalmount district.

For their part, revenue from local sources is budgeted at \$13.2 million or 10% of total revenue. The 2025 budget forecasts for this revenue are down from those of 2024. The decrease is attributable to:

- A forecast reduction in revenue from the issuing of construction permits;
- A stabilizing in real estate transactions, leading to a conservative forecast of transfer revenue;
- Lower interest rates;
- A decrease in revenue from recreational activity programs, mainly due to the closing of the Pierre Laporte pool.

The budget forecasts also show \$1.2 million in revenue corresponding to revenues from services delegated by the Agglomération de Montréal. The change is significant compared with the 2024 budget and is due to the entry, for 2025, of the amount of \$1,167,000 provided as a reimbursement from the Agglomération de Montréal to Town of Mount Royal for expenses incurred by the municipality to clean Agglomération water and sewer lines.

Revenue from government transfers totals \$2.5 million or 1.9% of total revenue.

Lastly, to reduce the financial impact of the budget increases on residents' tax bills, Council has decided to use \$3.6 million of the accumulated surplus to fund local expenditures and cover the increase in the aliquot share paid to the Agglomération de Montréal.

In conclusion, Town of Mount Royal's 2025 operating budget is proof of a commitment to maintaining a balance between responding to the community's growing needs and responsibly managing public funds. Although the increase in tax bills and municipal spending reflects current economic challenges, these adjustments are aimed at supporting essential improvements to urban and environmental infrastructures and advancing strategies for security, mobility, urban development and maintaining citizens' quality of life. What's more, prudent measures, such as drawing on the accumulated surplus, will help lessen the impact of the budget increases on taxpayers.

In short, this budget is not limited to addressing short-term needs but is part of a broader visionary approach focused on modernity, sustainability, residents' well-being and adapting to changing socio-economic and environmental needs while also preserving the essence and aspirations of the Mount Royal community.

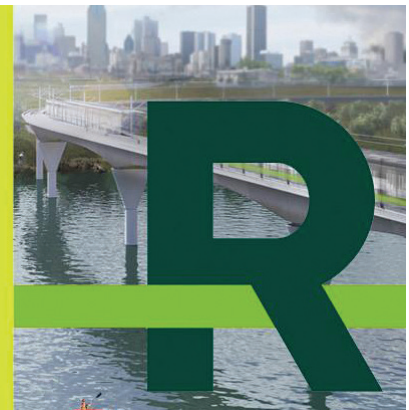

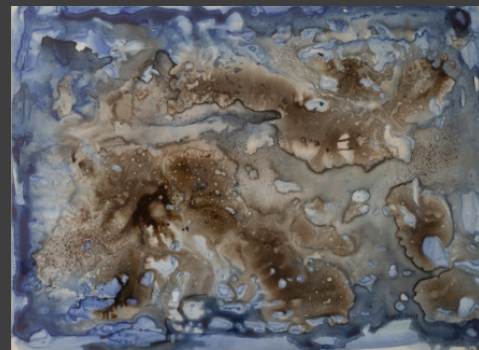
